Community Meeting to Discuss Citrus Courtyard Housing Project

On June 24 approximately 35 members of the Woodlands, including residents of Citrus Walk and current tenants of the offices in Citrus Courtyard met with Jim Parsons of P/A Design Resources to discuss a housing project proposed on the site of the existing office complex. The purpose of this meeting, which was called and led by P/A Design Resources, was to explain the project and solicit feedback from the members of the community members. By regulation, residents within 600 feet of the proposed project were notified of the meeting by personal invitation. In addition, the meeting was announced on the front page of last month's Woodlands Newsletter, on NextDoor and on Facebook.

Parsons provided high-level information on the project, which, as proposed, would include just over 80 total for-sale units including town houses and a condominium building. Townhouses would be on the outer portion the property facing Citrus Avenue and the back portion of Citrus Circle, across from the existing Citrus Walk townhouses. The Condominium would be in the center of the project and take up the space where the existing office complex sits.

Dick Hunt, of the architectural firm Hunt, Hale, Jones Architects described the design of the project. He indicated that the design did not include or resemble the 'contemporary motifs' present in the new developments downtown, but instead incorporated different 'materials and palettes' more in keeping with the existing community. Both Hunt and

Parsons said they anticipated that there would be changes to the design during the process, which, should the project be approved, could take 2 or more years; it would be at least 3 years before the project could actually start. Hunt also said that while the project was not originally seen as one that would cater to families, high housing costs in the area may have an impact on who ultimately purchases or occupies the properties.

Parsons also described proposed changes to the traffic corridor along Citrus Avenue and Citrus Circle, including a dedicated right turn lane off of Oak Grove Road into Citrus Circle, and prohibitions on turning left onto Citrus off of the end of Citrus Walk closest to Oak Grove Road. Parson said his firm had attempted to work with Mount Diablo Unified School District to understand the potential impact of the projects on the local schools, but that the district was unable to provide any guidance before a formal application for the project has been submitted.

Parsons said that the next step for his firm is to review the feedback received and potentially make changes to the proposal. Once this review is complete a formal application would be submitted to the city, Parsons indicated that the preparation for the application would take 3-4 months.

A range of questions and concerns were raised by community members in attendance. Some questioned whether the Yu family, who owns the property, had worked hard enough to make the existing office complex financially viable, or if the intent had always been to redevelop the property and 'flip it'. There was a significant amount of discussion about the impacts on the schools, electrical grid and basic infrastructure, and even more pertaining to the volume and timing of traffic associated with the development. Parsons presented preliminary traffic figures, provided by the city, which were met with skepticism by some in the audience. Not all of the feedback was negative, with one community member thanking Parsons for the project and noting that there was significant resistance when Citrus Walk was proposed, but that that project was successful and its residents are 'good neighbors'.

The Woodlands Association will continue to monitor this project and provide information to the community as it becomes available. We will also look for opportunities to gather feedback from the neighborhood and identify opportunities to influence the process to ensure a favorable outcome for the Woodlands. 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



Start early so you have time to plan your 4 year high school journey towards self-discovery!


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
