The Latest on Proposed Citrus Courtyard Housing Project

This summer representatives from P/A Design Resources and Hunt, Hale, Jones Architects met with representatives from the community to discuss a housing project proposed on the site of the existing office complex on Citrus Circle. At that time P/A Design Resources planned to spend several months preparing an application with the City of Walnut Creek. In the meantime, the Woodlands Association has prepared to play a role in the process so as to best represent the interests of the community.

The Woodlands Association is unusual, in that we are not a typical homeowners' association. We don't collect dues, and while we try to help when there are issues regarding matters such as property maintenance, we have no formal enforcement authority. Instead, we are a community advocacy organization, whose primary role is to share information, both with our constituents in the neighborhood and with relevant stakeholders in the community including city officials, commercial interests and property holders. We do not usually take positions on proposed developments and projects per se, instead trying to ensure that all involved are well informed and that the interests of our neighborhood are communicated.

Given this, we anticipate that our work with regard to the proposed project will involve listening to members of our neighborhood, and seeking to understand your concerns. In addition, we will work closely with the city to track the progress of the project, and make sure that concerns are raised and communicated to the appropriate parties. We plan to have neighborhood meetings and focus groups to allow you to share your thoughts on the proposal, and expect to start these early next year. We'll also plan to attend meetings of the City Council on the relevant committees who will be working on this project.

We received a note from Jim Parsons at P/A Design resources last week, and he indicated that their work has been delayed. They hoped to submit their application by this time but have decided to go through a pre-app submittal process which will allow them to get answers and feedback they need from the city in advance of submitting their formal application. He has committed to meeting with the Board to provide an update after they've done so, and we'll report back to the community what we learn.

The Woodlands Association will continue to monitor this project and provide information to the community as it becomes available. We welcome your feedback via e-mail at woodlandswalnutcreek@gmail.com or in person at one of our monthly Board meetings, held the first Saturday of the Month at 8 AM at Denica's.

What to do in a fire?

In light of the recent fires in the Bay Area, the Woodlands Association felt prudent to address fire safety. Every household can benefit by devising a plan ahead of time.

Last month the Fire Marshall wrote a guest article about Ready, Set, Go. **READY** – Prepare, **SET** – Have situational awareness, **GO** – Evacuate and follow your plan.

This month we would like to address how to develop your plan for fire safety. First, you need to create your plan. Some key elements that go into your fire safety plan include:

- Draw a map with escape routes.
- Identify a safe meeting spot, usually the end of your neighbor's driveway. Remember if you have little kids, minimize street crossings.
- Ensure there are two ways out of every room.
- Pair an adult to a child, do you have a caregiver who gets the baby? Who gets the toddler?
- If you have a two-story home, do you want a safety ladder?
- Don't forget your pets! Put them in your plan.
- Emergency contact, have a friend or relative that is out of the area serve as a central contact point. If you get separated communicate through one central place. Teach everyone to memorize the phone number.
- If you have an elderly neighbor or a neighbor with mobility issues, please reach out to them and ask how you can help each other.

Remember those fire drills you used to have in school? Do you have them at home? You should practice your fire safety plan every six months.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- Teach your kids fire safety "Get Low and Go" & "Stop, Drop and Roll"
- Close doors, it slows the fire
- Watch out for doorknobs they can be hot
- Never go back in, if your out don't be the hero alert fire rescue stay out
- Home Fire Drill practice every six months

TIPS FOR YOUR HOME

- Change batteries in your smoke and CO2 monitors yearly
- Test smoke and CO2 monitors every six months
- Have a Fire Extinguisher, replace it every 12 years
- Safety ladders for upstairs rooms

Get Low & Go – smoke and toxins rise to the top, get on the ground and crawl. Fire fighters do it too.

If you have time, putting a wet cloth around your nose and mouth can help.

Stop, Drop & Roll – clothes on fire. Stop moving, drop to the ground and roll around.

Mushrooms in Parchment


This is a festive vegetarian entrée that is special enough for a holiday dinner. Mushrooms and herbs combine with a delicious cream sauce that is both rich and satisfying. Use any combination of mushrooms that you prefer but a mixture of white button mushrooms, cremini mushrooms and oyster mushrooms is divine.

1 medium onion, diced

5 cups sliced or quartered mushrooms- any mixture you prefer- button mushrooms, cremini and oyster work well. (If using large portobello mushrooms, be sure to remove the gills and chop into manageable pieces.)

- 2 T Extra Virgin Olive Oil, divided
- 2 T Unsalted Butter, divided
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt, divided
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- ¼ cup dry white wine
- ¼ cup heavy cream
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped fresh rosemary
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped fresh sage
- 1 Tablespoon finely chopped parsley
- 4 small red or Yukon gold potatoes, cooked and quartered
- 1 T Unsalted Butter
- 1. Prepare 4 pieces of parchment paper—about 14 inches long
- 2. In a large skillet, sauté the chopped onion in 1 T of Olive oil,1 T of butter and ½ teaspoon of salt. Cook over medium until translucent. Place in a large bowl.
- 3. Add the remaining oil and butter and the mushrooms and salt. Cook over medium high until liquid has evaporated and mushrooms are golden brown.
- 4. Add the white wine and stir, scraping up any brown bits from the bottom of the pan.
- 5. Add the cream and simmer for about a minute. Add mushrooms to the onions and add in the parsley.
- 6. Divide the potato amongst the parchment squares and place in the middle of the square and top with the mushroom mixture. Top with ¼ T of unsalted butter.
- 7. Gather the edges of the paper and tie with oven proof twine.
- 8. Bake for 15-20 mins until hot.

These can be assembled up to one day ahead. Allow for a few extra minutes in the oven to come up to temperature. Serve hot.
