ENCINA GRANDE SHOPPING CENTER REMODEL TO BEGIN SOON

The Encina Grande Shopping Center, at Ygnacio Valley Road and Oak Grove Road, will be soon be undergoing its first remodel since opening in 1965. The proposed redevelopment includes four components: (1) demolishing the existing Safeway and Walgreens spaces and constructing a larger footprint Whole Foods; (2) moving Walgreens to where Katz Furniture is currently

located, and adding a drive-thru pharmacy; (3) a remodel and façade upgrade to the remaining Center; and (4) upgrades to the parking lot, landscaping, and pedestrian areas.

The façade renovation will incorporate a contemporary blend of craftsman style with a modern approach, while at the same time respecting the scale and context of the surrounding residential neighborhood. The building remodel and façade upgrade will include asbestos, lead based paint, and termite damage abatement, cutting back the existing roof overhang to provide increased natural lighting, removal of dated unreinforced masonry buttressed supports replaced by contemporary design steel and stone veneer columns, removal and replacement of existing concrete walkways, additional walkway lighting, the addition of a tower element at the southwest corner for identity signage, new exterior



finishes including plaster, composite siding, and stone veneer, and the addition of extensive ornamental steel trellis work to accentuate contemporary architecture.

Walgreens is expected to open in late 2015. Whole Foods intends to be open in the Fall of 2016. All of the shops will be open during construction and other than Whole Foods, there are no new retailers to announce at the time of this newsletter's printing. Regency Centers will keep the center operating and phase the improvements, which are expected to be complete by the 2016 holiday season.

Foothill Middle School

California Assessment on Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)

Students at Foothill have been practicing a new assessment that we will trial in April and May. It is called the California Assessment on Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP). This year's result will not be available to schools or parents but it is still very important for our students to do a good job on the assessment. Our data will be used by Smarter Balance Assessment Consortium (SBAC) to design the assessment for next year's actual implementation. You can view a short video that we are showing to students which explains their participation in the trail program. Go to YouTube and search for "SBAC Middle School Video".

The Foothill testing window this year will open on March 31 and continue until May 15. The reason for the lengthy testing window is the availability of computers. For this reason, students will be taking this online assessment during their regularly scheduled English or math classes in a computer lab. We estimate each student will need three class periods to complete the trial assessment. Please contact the administrative team if you have any questions or concerns about CAASPP. Locker Help Needed

Foothill is unique in being the only MDUSD middle school to have student lockers. These lockers require care and repair each year, however, and the hours involved in cleaning and preparing them for use are significant.

Foothill staff is seeking parent volunteers to lead clean outs during the week after school finishes and to prep lockers for fall use at the end of the summer. Without this much needed support, our school may be unable to issue lockers next year. The City Should Put Our Community First By Omitting A Supermarket From Any Shadelands Development, Especially With Safeway Selling Its Shadelands Property

The entire process of considering a rezoning and development of Safeway's Shadelands property at Oak Grove and Ygnacio Valley has been skewed by the fact that Safeway, the supermarket corporation, was also Safeway, the owner of the Shadelands property. That is why at every instance, this process has been pushed forward with the precondition that a Safeway supermarket be bundled into the proposed Shadelands development, even as evidence mounted that a supermarket should not be a part of this development because there is not enough demand for three supermarkets at this location (Nob Hill, Whole Foods (who will be replacing Safeway at Encina Grande), and Safeway's proposed 55,000 sf store in the Shadelands).

Last month, Safeway announced a merger deal with Albertsons. As part of that deal, Safeway will be selling its real estate subsidiary, Property Development Corporation ("PDC"), which owns the Shadelands property. Safeway's impending sale of PDC means that the tether between the Shadelands property and Safeway will be severed. The new owner of the Shadelands property, whoever that will be, may well have different plans for it. As well, the new owner of the property will not have Safeway's motivation to bundle a supermarket into the development that will drive Nob Hill, a Safeway competitor across the street, out of business.

Building a supermarket in the Shadelands will impose significant negative impacts on our community, including undermining the viability of the Citrus Marketplace shopping center when it loses Nob Hill as a supermarket anchor, exacerbating traffic and congestion when the former Nob Hill customers are diverted onto Oak Grove and Ygnacio Valley to shop for groceries in the Shadelands, increasing residential street traffic, and creating more dangerous streets for pedestrians.

With Safeway jettisoning its Shadelands property, there is less reason than ever for the City to include a supermarket in this rezoning. A supermarket should be left out of any rezoning and development in the Shadelands so as to avoid the significant negative impacts that will otherwise be imposed on our community.

I live in the Woodlands and my personalized license plates were stolen last month. The plates were:

MUTT LMO K9YACHT DK9LIMO FIDO MBL DOGGYRV

They were stolen from three cars, a boat trailer and a camp trailer in front of my house on Kelobra Ct. I am offering a reward of \$100 per set of plates, \$500 for all. K9YACHT and DOGGYRV are single plates and the others are sets of two. THE DMV WILL NOT SIMPLY REPLACE THE PLATES. Unless I recover the stolen plates, they are gone forever because they would come up as stolen if found on a vehicle. I just want them back. This is strictly a "no questions asked" reward.

Because this crime may have been committed by a young person or persons, I understand that this is just fooling around. I don't want to

get anyone in trouble, I just want the license plates back.

STEALING LICENSE PLATES IS A FELONY! I found this out when I called Walnut Creek PD to report the theft. Each set of plates was written up as a separate theft, so someone could be facing FIVE FELONY CHARGES. As I said, I have no interest in getting anyone in trouble. No tricks; if I get the plates back I'll pay the reward and I won't press charges. Drought Tips:

With a record drought underway, the Contra Costa Water District has implemented a voluntary program targeting a 15% reduction in water use by its customers. Now that the not-so-rainy season is behind us it's a good time to dust off some old water saving wisdom, along with a few new tips as well. Here are some tips to help you get to your 15%.

Inside the home:

Happily, when it comes to washing your dishes, the best things to do are also the easiest:

- Washing dishes in the dishwasher is more efficient then doing them by hand (score!)
- Pre-rinse your dishes as little as possible before putting them in the dishwasher (double-score!), especially if your dishwasher is a newer model, which will clean more thoroughly than an older one.
- Instead of scrubbing your pots and pans underrunning water, let them soak awhile instead. Go have a cocktail and clean em later (triple score!). If you're lucky maybe your spouse will end up cleaning them instead. Be strategic.

You can save water in the bathroom too, though it's not as much fun as in the kitchen:

- Keep a couple of empty pitchers by your shower, and fill them as the water get's warm enough for you to jump in. Otherwise this water just gets wasted. Then use it to water your plants.
- Take a stop-start shower, where you turn the water off while you are lathering or shampooing and then back on just to rinse. Definitely a pain, but not so bad in the summer when it's warm.
- Use the same stop-start approach in the sink when you are brushing your teeth or shaving. To clarify, you do not actually need to be in the sink for this to work.
- Gross but effective- rely on the old potty-time mantra, "If it's yellow, let it mellow, if it's brown, flush it down". Just remember to discontinue if you're having company.



Outside the home:

Take pride in your brown lawn- it's a great way to signal to your neighbors that you are doing your part to help out! Give judgmental, disapproving looks as you walk by your neighbors with lush green lawns- peer pressure can be fun! Virtually all grasses will recover once they receive moisture at the end of the drought.

You are still gonna want to water your trees during the drought, they may suffer from stress and attract insects if you don't. There are things you can do to use less water however:

- Apply 2-3 inches of organic mulch.
- Bury a soaker hose just above the tree's roots. Run it once a month for about an hour for a good, deep water.

General tips:

- Always water in the early morning or the evening.
 Watering in the middle of the day is not a good idea,
 because much of the water evaporates instead of getting to the plants.
- Water deeply but less frequently for better and more water efficient results.
- For extra credit, get a smart controller which manages your watering times and frequencies based on weather patterns, soil moisture, evaporation rates, etc.

Some of these tips are more extreme and only make sense while the drought persists but others are good idea no matter how much rain has fallen. For now our water reductions are voluntary- do your part to help until the drought ends.

Design Review Commission Approves "The Orchards"

On Wednesday, April 16th, Walnut Creek's Design Review Commission met to review the status of Safeway's proposal for "The Orchards" and to determine whether to recommend that the proposal be sent to the Planning Commission for a vote. If approved, Safeway hopes to break ground in time to move to its new location in the Orchards when its current lease at the Encina Grande Shopping Center expires on September 30, 2015. After a presentation from the development company, a public comment period, and further comments from the members of the Commission, the motion to move the proposal on to the Planning Commission passed by a vote of 2-1. A representative from Property Development Centers, Safeway's property development company, made a brief presentation at the start of the session. PDC stressed the large number of meetings with both the committee and members of the community, and the lengths it believes it has gone to incorporate community feedback into its planning. PDC also discussed its partnership with Northern California Presbyterian Home Services on the Senior Housing portion of the project.

During the public comment phase of the meeting, seven members of the community expressed their views on the project. Six of the seven voiced opposition to the project, based on concerns ranging from the removal of trees (particularly those designated as "highly protected") from the property to increased traffic. Others were more generally opposed to new development and bemoaned the reduction of open space in Walnut Creek. The seventh speaker was more specific in her concern, regarding the right turn lane onto Ygnacio Valley road and potential safety issues associated with its proposed design. She did not express an overall position on the proposal.

Following public comment Commissioner Gorny expressed his positive feelings regarding the project. He feels that the general area is in need of revitalization and that the tradeoffs associated with a project like this are well balanced. Commissioner Fotheringham expressed broader reservations about the project, though many of his objections were technical in nature pertaining to deviations in the proposal and the site plan. Chairman Volkmann also expressed support of the project, predicting that the increased entertainment options will be a benefit to the community, particularly for young families.

The motion to move the proposal onto the Planning Commission passed 2-1, with Chairman Volkmann and Commissioner Gorny in favor and Commissioner Fotheringham opposed. Commissioners Weiss and Cothren were absent.

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


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
