### What's Next? A Community Prepared

In the past nine months our Woodlands community has taken critical steps towards preparedness in the event of emergencies. Until we are tested locally with a real disaster, the question will continue to be... what emergency?

What emergency are we preparing for? A bird flu pandemic and general quarantine? A Martinez refinery disaster? A 7.1 East Bay earthquake? A terrorist total power disruption? A Livermore lab disaster? The big Pacific storm?

How can we be prepared for something not yet defined? What are the common denominators across the more likely emergencies in our area?

The Woodlands now has several dozen neighbors that are much closer to answering questions such as this, and as a result, have a deeper passion for emergency preparedness in our neighborhood. These neighbors are CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) graduates. They are beginning to know what the rest of us don't yet know. This core group of neighbors labored through six hardhitting, three-hour, hands on training sessions at our CC Fire Department Training Center.


Members of our Woodlands Assoc. Board have met with several Woodlands CERT graduates to begin mapping out what needs to be done for our community in the event of an emergency. The feedback from the CERT training has been stunning! It confirms that there is a deep need and passion to create an emergency prepared Woodlands community.

Joe Warren said, "The more folks who are hands-on informed, the better we'll all be in a real disaster -- which inevitably will come."

Marthe Parvin said we need to "share a set plan-of-action with our community utilizing each other's areas of strength."

Tom Mahon indicated that every household in the Woodlands "needs at least one person trained."

The Woodlands Board has designated board member, Mr. John Gregory, along with two core graduates (yet to be named), to co-develop and co-chair what will become the next steps towards emergency preparedness for our Woodlands community. This group will determine what funding we need, if any, and where it will come from. Part of the group's efforts will be to understand what it will take for our activities and plans to become relatively self-perpetuating. This group will also review the "most likely" disasters to hit our area and come up with the most efficient and appropriate plans as our *next steps*.

The Woodlands Association will host the next session for our Woodlands CERT graduates on Wednesday, December 14th from **7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m** in the multiuse room of Valle Verde Elementary at 3275 Peachwillow. We encourage every CERT graduate to join us for this important "next steps kickoff". No RSVP is required but we will send a follow-up note to the CERT participant email IDs we have gathered to-date. As always, all Woodlands neighbors are invited to attend... not just our CERT graduates.

The holidays are fast approaching, which means our homes and lawns are all decorated with beautiful and fun ornaments! It also means the crooks are out in full force. How do you protect yourself, your property and your neighbors? Be aware! Be aware and call the police **whenever** you see or hear something or someone suspicious. ### Free Refrigerator & Freezer Recycling \$35 rebate

PG&E is partnering with JACO Environmental (JACO) on a refrigerator/ freezer recycling program to reduce electricity consumption. Old refrigerators and freezers can use up to three times as much energy as newer ones. JACO will pick up and recycle working refrigerators and freezers that are in working condition, manufactured before 1990, and 14-27 cubic feet in size. If you sign up through the website or call the number below to schedule the appointment, PG&E will send you a check for \$35 (while supplies last).

We have been contacted by several families about dog owners running into dog doo all the time. running their dogs at Valle Verde. If you do have to pass through It's great to run the dogs but not at Valle Verde. This is not a place must keep the dog on to allow dogs to relieve themselves. That's just what is happening. No matter how hard you try to pick up after your dog after a run at the school it just doesn't

work. Our kids playing there are Valle Verde with your dog, you

a leash. Firstly it is a county regulation and of course the dog waste just cannot be controlled or

collected when the dogs run free.

Clearly unleashed dogs at the school are also a safety hazard for younger children on the school grounds. A bigger dog can inadvertently run right over a small child. Because the school fields are used extensively after school hours, many of the complaints we have received come from parents and coaches that find dog waste on clothes of the children after team practice. This

happens at school recess as well.

Because of the E waste, always take gloves, bags and appropriate tools to collect your dog's waste and then properly dispose of the bags and keep

the tools clean.

There certainly are alternatives to Valle Verde for running your dogs. First and closest is the open space bordering the Woodlands. Leashes recommended unless your dogs are well controlled by

your signals and voice commands. Read the open space regulations posted on this.

Other alternatives for running your dogs off leash include San Miguel Park, but only during certain hours. ### What to do With Those Fall Leaves?!

The cool winds are blowing and the trees are showing their beautiful fall colors. Along with the beauty come lots of leaves to pickup and dispose of.

According to the city, each homeowner is responsible for collection and disposal of all leaves that fall on their property. Here are some tips on properly disposing of your fall leaves:

1. Dispose of leaves in the green waste trash container. If too many leaves fall for the green waste container consider bagging and saving leaves, then disposing of a couple of bags per week.



2. Mulching is another great option.

3. CAUTION: Do not sweep, rake, or blow leaves into the streets. Why?

a. Leaf piles in the street of more than two or three inches high will cause street sweepers to clog and malfunction, so the operators are instructed to go around them. So leaves blown into the street stay there until fall winds and rain kick in, creating messes that other neighbors have to clean up.

b. If no one cleans the leaves that are left in the street, they generally end up down gradient of the property that created them  blocking a storm drain. Each year the city spends countless hours during storm events cleaning out storm drains blocked with leaves.

And what if they don't clog the storm drain? Well, they end up wherever the storm drain leads, which is usually a surface water such as a lake or river. Here they can create something called Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD), which creates an oxygen deficient environment in the water and can kill fish and other wildlife.

So collect and dispose of those leaves - it creates a nicer neighborhood, less work for neighbors and the city, and helps to protect wildlife!


