Traditional British Mince Pies

If you would like to bring a different sweet treat to your table this holiday season, why not try baking some traditional British mince pies! These are a festive sweet pastry, traditionally consumed during the Christmas and New Year period. Mince pies have been eaten as part of a traditional



British Christmas since as long ago as the 16th century. Back then they were made of meat but are now filled with sweet mincemeat; a preserve typically containing a mixture of apple, dried fruits such as raisins and sultanas, sugar, spices, and brandy. Mince pies normally have a pastry top, but versions may also be found without the top in which case they are known as *mince tarts*. Mincemeat pops up on supermarket shelves during the holiday season and should not be too tricky to find. Give them a try!



<u>Ingredients</u> – makes 24


1 packet of bought puff/flakey pastry

1 small jar of mincemeat

1 egg beaten

Powdered sugar

- Heat oven to 425F/gas 7
- Roll out pastry to 1/16 -1/8 inch
- Cut 2 ½ inch rounds with plain cutter
- Cut 2 inch rounds with plain cutter for tops
- Fit larger rounds in patty/muffin tins (the shallower the better)
- Put 1 teaspoon of mincemeat in each
- Dampen edges of pie bases with cold water and place smaller rounds on top and press to seal
- Make a small hole in the top of each pie with a small sharp knife to let steam out
- Brush with egg wash for a baked golden glaze
- Bake towards top of oven for 15-20 minutes until light golden brown
- Remove and cool on rack before sifting powered sugar over lightly to decorate
- * To be decorative, cut stars or other fancy shapes for lids and omit the hole for steam
- ** Suet may be an ingredient in the preserve, making mince pies unsuitable for vegetarians

Postings that are pleas for help to find lost pets would seem acceptable – as long as they are removed as quickly as they are put up once the pet is found. 

- * 8th graders who do not live in the Northgate attendance area
- * The forms must be turned into the MDUSD Administrative Office at MDUSD Student Services, 1936 Carlotta Drive, Concord, CA 94519
- * The application deadline is January 15, 2010

As per the Intradistrict Transfer agreement, students on Intradistrict Transfers can be displaced prior to September 15th of each school year IF student's residing in the Foothill attendance area cannot be scheduled.


