120 Years of Tunnels

A look back at the trip from Walnut Creek to Oakland

At the end of the Civil War in 1865 it took quite a few hours by stage coach to trek from Walnut Creek to Oakland. The coaches had to snake along several roads just to get to the East Bay hills. Originally the dusty road over the top of the Berkeley & Oakland hills was called Summit Road. Just before the Civil War, the first telegraph line was strung on poles from Oakland over the hills all the way out to Antioch. The line went right through Walnut Creek and then out Ygnacio Valley Road. The dusty Summit Road portion of the telegraph line route was renamed Telegraph Road. From the west, traffic over

the Oakland and Berkeley hills traveled up what is now known as Claremont Canyon and east of the hills it was called Fish Ranch Road. The coach drivers got quite good at using their wooden brakes on both sides of the summit.

In the mid-1800s Walnut Creek had already become an important trade and business center. Both local residents and business people were discussing a tunnel through the Oakland or Berkeley hills to improve and expand access to and from Walnut Creek's thriving downtown. By the late 1870s, the Oakland & Contra Costa Tunnel Company



was authorized to dig the first 300 foot tunnel as part of their Kennedy Toll Road project. This project allowed access to both stage and freight coaches and cut hours out of the trek to and from Oakland. The tunnel was dark, dank and spooky, much like an old railroad tunnel.

Due to ever increasing trade and traffic, during the 1890s the two county governments involved began a 1,100 foot tunnel that was finally opened in October 1903 at a cost of \$36,000. This tunnel was also timber-lined like a railroad tunnel and was still very dark and spooky. The tunnel was nearly 6 yards wide and better accommodated the mainly horse drawn traffic. However... it was still only one-way-at-a-time and coach, car and truck drivers had to signal their entry with kerosene lanterns or by burning newspapers. The tunnel entrance from the west side was well over 200 feet above the current Caldecott tunnel entrance and on the east side it was approached from the top of Ashby Avenue in Berkeley on a newly carved Tunnel Road. The tunnel was named Broadway Tunnel. Inside the tunnel it was dank and leaky most of the year.

By the 1920s this tunnel facility was proving completely inadequate. Model T Fords were abundant and automobile queues grew and grew at each entrance. It wasn't until 1929 that the first two Caldecott Tunnel bores got underway. It took a full eight years to 1937 before their completion. These tunnels became know as the Broadway "Low Level" Tunnels because they emptied right on to Broadway leading into Oakland. They were also about 200 feet "Lower" than the old tunnel portal. These tunnels were (and still are) both 3,600 feet long. The third tunnel bore was not completed and opened to traffic until 1964. This last bore is about 3,770 feet long.

So here we are over 120 years later still traveling through our East Bay hill tunnels by car and BART today. Perhaps we should now be asking, what can we do to make these treks greener? And how many of these trips are really necessary?
