New MDUSD Superintendent's Road Show Comes to Northgate By City Councilman Kish Rajan

On February 1, Steve Lawrence took over the helm at the Mt. Diablo Unified School District, replacing interim Superintendent Dick Nicoll who retired last month. Lawrence, who previously was superintendent of the Washington Unified School District in West Sacramento, is under contract to run MDUSD through June 30, 2013.

In his first week on the job, Lawrence began a series of seven community meetings to greet the public at middle and high schools in Bay Point, Concord, Pleasant Hill, and Walnut Creek. His goals for the sessions were to introduce himself to the community and to hear ideas from parents and other residents about how the district can work with them to benefit students.

The session at Northgate was well attended by parents, students, teachers, administrators, Teacher's Union President Mike Noce, School Board Member Linda Mayo, and other city officials. Lawrence began the meeting by delivering a PowerPoint presentation that outlined the well publicized financial challenges the district faces. He was direct and clear that the district has already made difficult cuts, and that even deeper cuts are necessary given the lack of funding that is coming from the State of California. Lawrence explained the State's budget crisis has a significant reduction in the amount of funding that the District expected. And because the District is required to balance its budget, further cuts are mandatory. The district has already cut teachers, administrators, music and sports programs. Lawrence indicated that, unless the fiscal picture changes, deeper cuts will likely result in school closures and increased class sizes.

He indicated that it would be preferable to raise revenues locally to avoid such deep cuts. He expressed, however, that after the unsuccessful parcel tax campaign last year (Measure D), district officials did research polling and found that the climate remains unfavorable to try again to pass a parcel tax (particularly given the required 2/3 threshold). He outlined, as an alternative, an idea to pass a facilities bond (only requiring 55% approval) to deploy a solar power system that could create significant operating savings to the district. Currently, the district pays \$3.2 million per year in energy costs that could be reduced by a newer more efficient system. The savings then could be used to fund operations and avoid some cuts. The reaction by the audience was mixed. Though some did appreciate the creativity, others remained skeptical of funding operations by "borrowing". And, the operating deficit is much larger than could be saved through this program.

Lawrence then took many questions from the audience. Parents expressed their frustrations with the cuts and sought Lawrence's commitment that he would do everything possible to keep the cuts as far away from the classroom as possible. Questioners also sought his commitment to streamline the district administration to make it more efficient and responsive to the community. Lawrence indicated

Woodlands Walk

My husband and I went for a walk around our neighborhood and began counting trees, many sporting bare branches and many soaking up the rains through their leaves and needles. How many different species of trees do we have here?

When the Woodlands was first developed it began in an old walnut orchard. The developers advertised that every lot had a mature tree. When they began to build out of the old orchard, they knew they had to plant a mature tree on the new lots – hence the many olive trees came to be.

Families who moved into this pleasant corner of Walnut Creek came from many different parts of the United States and the world. Each family planted a tree which evoked a memory of where they came from. In our forgiving Mediterranean climate, it seemed that what we planted survived. Today, although many of us have said goodbye to our walnut and olive trees, some still survive – that's two species.

On our walk, we added evergreen and deciduous Magnolia trees, Liquidambar (Sweet Gum), and Birch. The city planted Maples, Ash, Ginkgos, Pistachios, Sycamores, Fruitless Mulberry, and Eastern Oaks.

Some families really wanted to keep California in their landscapes, so they planted Monterey Pines, Redwoods, citrus trees – Orange, Lemon, Lime, and Grapefruit, (Are they native here?).

Imports came from Australia in the form of Eucalyptus. Our surrounding open space already had the California Live Oaks. Then neighbors planted Yew, Fig, Chinese Tallow, Palms – at least four kinds – Crepe Myrtle, Flowering Cherry, Plum, and Pear, and Japanese Maples. Evergreens included Deodar Cedar, Blue Spruce, Douglas Fir, and Cypress. I think we saw 33 different trees.

Take a look on your next walk and see how many you can identify.

Burkett's Pool Plastering was finally able to break ground on our diving pool remodel in late January. The pool area was quickly reduced to large piles of concrete and dirt as an enormous crew readied the property for its overhaul.

To date, demolition is completed on both the diving and wading pool (this developed a leak last September that required a plumbing retrofit in the bottom of the pool) and new plumbing and federally compliant drains were installed for both pools, and our first county inspection went beautifully.

Mid February will see the new layer of gunite laid, and concrete decking poured around the diving pool. We are still hoping to see the project completed by mid March, but much of the schedule depends on our weather.

As soon as the pool is completed, the Cabana Club will host their First annual Polar Bear Plunge to show off the new pool and allow those who can't wait to take a dip. Hot cocoa and cookies will be on hand for all who come to see our beautiful new facility.

he has already taken the important step of choosing to not back fill two Assistant Superintendent positions as a means of reducing some costs.

Lastly, parents asked the new Superintendent to outline his vision for the district, and to discuss how he would rebuild trust with the community. He indicated that his vision is to focus on the students first and to put them in the best position possible to graduate from high school and to be prepared to go on to post secondary education or training. And he expressed a commitment to working with the community to build stronger ties.

As one of your Council persons covering the Woodlands neighborhood, I was impressed by the session. I think Mr. Lawrence did a nice job at this meeting, and I've received feedback that other community meetings were well attended and the feedback regarding Steve's commitment have been favorable. He definitely appears to be a sincere and experienced leader. He communicated with us honestly tonight and was willing to take on the tough questions. The situation is clearly very difficult, but I think Steve is off to a solid start.

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
