
# THE WOODLANDS

**MAY 2004** 



Well, here we go again. The rains have subsided and I see many of us outside doing our gardening, fixing fences, moving stones and I also see painting and roofing jobs in progress again. Most of us have houses with painted wood siding along with the ubiquitous Woodlands stucco. If it has been four or five years since the last paint job, it may be time for touch-up on the wood or even a full repaint. Granted... most of us have this work done by professionals but you can get quality results by doing it yourself as well.

Here are some brief tips for those that want to paint on their own... or just use the tips as a checklist when you are watching your painter like a hawk to see that they do the job right. Too often, people pick a color and give the job to a painter they might not even know. If you do have painting done by a professional it's a good idea to get what they are about to do in writing.

#### FOR STARTERS

To make a new paint job last longer, you really need to "prep" the paint surfaces right. Preparing the surfaces means many things but for starters you should fix moisture problems such as leaky gutters, errant sprinklers or constantly damp bushes up against the house. Then you need to remove any obviously loose paint making sure there is a solid base. Some scraping and sanding will likely be required. Wear gloves and a mask over your nose and mouth to avoid breathing in dust particles. The preparation work is easily 75% of your time and effort for a good paint job.

#### **CLEAN IT**

The most overlooked detail is simply to wash the house's surfaces. If you read a can of quality house paint, it will say something like, "scrape all loose paint, repair all damaged areas, prime the repairs and clean the surface thoroughly." More often than not, commercial painters will start by patching, spackling, caulking, some priming and then just paint. Over a couple years painted wood and stucco actually collect a large amount of grime and most often the grime includes some oils

For any of the Woodlands' one-story homes you should be able to clean most of the surface with one of those brushes on a rod... with or without a garden hose attachment. Surprisingly plain water with a brush is usually sufficient for cleaning. Avoid using a high-pressure hose nozzle pointed up under the wood siding. For two story homes, get some help with the wash down.

If you notice mildew present anywhere on the wood siding, scrub those areas with Clorox mixed with three or four parts water. Regardless of who does the washing... wait three our four days for everything to dry thoroughly before continuing anything. You might want to rent a pressure washer. The local tool rental stores provide these for less than \$100.00 a day. If you rent a pressure washer you may as well clean those oil spots on your garage floor too. The tool rental stores rent paint sprayers as well if you choose to spray instead of brush.

### CAULK IT

When everything is thoroughly dry go back and prime any bare wood with good primer paint. Then caulk or "spackle" every split, crack or seam. Use high quality exterior grade caulk and/or spackling compound. Most of the professionals use their wet fingers and rags to blend the caulk or spackle with the wood surfaces. If you are particularly sensitive to solutions or compounds, use thin rubber gloves.

Now apply a *thin*, stain-blocking coat of "alkyd" primer paint on both the wood siding and the wooden trim. Alkyd paint is actually oil-based but dries and cures very quickly. Your final topcoat can still be water-based Latex paint. This primer-coat step is often skipped by commercial house painters. If it is skipped, the Latex topcoat paint can be a bit porous and can let moisture seep through to the wood. This will shorten the life of the paint. You will hear claims that the final topcoat of latex paint is self-priming. Unless you get a lifetime warranty, don't buy this statement. If you are using paint spraying equipment for the final topcoat, then spray the alkyd primer as well.

#### REPAINTING THE HOUSE CONTINUED FROM FRONT PAGE

The above preparation recommendations apply to your wood walls and any wood trim. The stucco on our homes is usually in good condition and need not be primed. Any stucco patching that might be required can be done with stucco premix that comes in bags available from all the builder supply stores. Prime the patches just as you would bare wood. A small tip here is that most alkyd primers can be tinted or colored to approximate the hue of the final topcoat. That effectively eliminates the possibility of any white primer show-through on the wood surfaces later.

#### PAINT IT

Painting itself is actually the quick part. If you are comfortable using a brush, go for it. Just make sure to use good brushes but watch out for a brush that might be too heavy for you. Keep your topcoat of paint even. Many companies and individuals use rented paint spray equipment to paint exteriors. The trick here is to mask everything with painters' plastic sheets and top quality 1.5 inch masking tape. I have read in several places that 3M #2040 sticks well but comes off easy. I found this to be true on my last do it yourself painting job.

So if you are spraying, you first mask off all the window & door glass. Place tarps on the ground, terraces or anything you need to protect. The spray mist can blow around and get on anything close. Then spray-paint the trim around the doors, windows and vents. If you are painting the house and trim all one color, you can spray the trim, eaves and walls all at once with perhaps the exception of rain gutters because you don't want to overspray on the roof shingles. Also decide whether to paint any exposed concrete foundation as well otherwise you will need to tape and mask the concrete foundation too.

If the window trim and doors are to be a different hue than the walls, you will pull off the plastic & tape after painting the trim... then re-mask the freshly painted windows and doors along with the trim and casing. Finally spray paint the wood siding and the stucco. The experts say that for every ten minutes you spend taping and masking for spray-painting... you will save well over an hour of brush-stroking. I have found this to be true. A last word about rain gutters... usually painting the rain gutters is easiest with a traditional paintbrush.

Most professionals use an alkyd primer and high quality latex topcoat paint. The higher quality paint is truly worth the money. As always, use the best quality brushes, cleaners, facemasks and thin rubber gloves if needed. I hope to see someone out there painting now that the weather is right.
