

New Assessments: iReady and California Measurement of Academic Performance and Progress (CalMAPP)
Students have begun the iReady Language Arts assessment this week. This is a new assessment that replaces the quarterly language arts benchmark tests that have been given the past few years. Many MDUSD middle schools are piloting iReady which resembles the Smarter Balance Assessment or CalMAPP which are aligned to the new Common Core Standards.
Students are currently being assessed during their regular Core class in the computer lab. They work at their own pace and questions are built based on their responses. This online common assessment provides immediate data to support classroom instruction and learning design. Five Tips to Prevent Car Break-ins:

1. Keep Things Out of Sight

If you have any valuables, such as an iPod, purse or video camera, store it under the seat or in the glove compartment. Most of the time, thieves are just looking for a quick buck and if they see something they like, they'll smash and grab. You'll also want to put anything that looks like it could contain something valuable, such as a box or briefcase, in the trunk to prevent car break-ins. If the box on your front seat says "Apple Computer, Inc." on it, it doesn't matter what's inside – it looks valuable. Sometimes keeping your car clean will do more than just impress your friends.

2. Get a Detachable Stereo Face

A car thief won't steal a stereo that he can't use. Purchasing a car audio receiver with a detachable front panel will make your stereo useless to any would-be crook. That is, of course, presuming you actually detach the face of the head unit and take it with you. Even if you don't want to carry the face plate with you, detach the front panel and hide it away to prevent car break-ins. Criminals want things quick and easy, so a missing face plate may make them move on to the next car.

3. Keep Your Car Secure

This seems like a no-brainer, but many people don't lock their car when they're "just running into the store" or "they'll only be a minute." A minute is all the time it takes to break into someone's car. Lock your doors to prevent car break-

ins. Don't make the thief's job any easier by handing him an open door. Also, make sure to keep your windows rolled up. Your car may get hot, but at least it won't get emptied.

4. Park it in a Public Location

That sweet, little-known spot in the alley in the back may always be open, but it is also quite private – which is perfect for any criminal. Park your car in a high-traffic area where it will be seen by a bunch of people. If you are parking somewhere at night, park your vehicle near a light or in view of a security camera to prevent car break-ins. Once again, criminals want guick and easy jobs, so they don't want a lot of publicity or visibility.

5. Get an Alarm

Most of the time when people think of alarms, they think of the one that accidentally goes off in the parking lot and the owner isn't there to turn it off. Yes, that is annoying, but next time this happens, take notice that there are no car thieves around that noisy car. They want to keep a low profile. These types of criminals will avoid cars if they can see that it is alarmed. Some companies even manufacturer inexpensive products that only make it look like your car has an alarm, which also will help prevent car break-ins.

Home Improvement Corner - Installing a Motion Detector Lamp

The days are getting dark earlier and, with at least break-in in the Woodlands in the last month, it's not a bad time to make sure your home is well lit after hours. One of the best ways to do this is to install motion detector lamps in key spots outside your home. Fortunately, there are a lot of different lamps to choose from, and they are fairly easy to install. Here are a few quick tips to think about:

1) Where do I want to put my lamps? Some spots may seem obvious- the walkway to your front door, the side gate to your back yard, etc. All the places you might walk through as you approach your home. Typically you'll want to install your lamps 6-10 feet off the ground, and it is courteous to avoid pointing them directly at a neighbor's window or back yard if it can be avoided.

Remember, also, that one of the key functions of these lights is not just to light your way, but also to "alert" potential intruders that they've been identified. So you may want to point a lamp in a dark corner that you may never walk through; and that you would appreciate no one else walking through either!

2) What kind of lamp? The most reliable and longest lasting lamps will be wired right into your existing electrical. However, installing a hardwired lamp takes more skill and is more time

consuming. Many may prefer to simply hire a qualified electrician for the job. In addition, you are going to be more limited in where you can put a hardwired lamp as well.

- 3) As an alternative, battery powered LED lamps are available as well. Both indoor (for closets and such) and outdoor lamps are available, and you can install them just about anywhere. These lamps are not as durable and require yet another set of (typically expensive D- size) batteries to replace, but for many, the convenience can't be beat.
- **4)** Regardless of which type of lamp you'll put in, you're going to be drilling a few holes in the side of your house to support the lamp's housing. One tip is to attach a small piece of wood to the house and then install the lamp to that. This will prevent you from having an odd pattern of holes in your house if you ever want to replace the lamp- the odd holes will be in the block of wood instead.

Amazon, of course, has a wide variety of lamps to choose from, starting at under \$10 and moving up in price from there. Search for "Motion Detector Light" in the Patio, Lawn and Garden section to get started. Costco sometimes has good deals as well on a more limited selection. Depending on how many lamps you want to install you'll need an afternoon (or more), but while everyone else is taking down their holiday lights, it's a great time to put up some more of your own!

Holiday Recipe: Super Bowl Texas Red Chili

Super Bowl Texas Red Chili

Prep 45 mins · Cook 45 mins Makes 8 to 10 servings Difficulty: Easy

Ingredients:

- 3 dried quajillo chiles*
- 2 dried ancho chiles*
- 2 pounds 85% lean ground beef
- 6 slices thick cut smoked bacon, cut into 1/2-inch pieces (8 ounces)
- 3 large Vidalia onions, or other sweet onions, chopped
- 2 green sweet peppers, chopped
- 2 serrano peppers, finely chopped*
- 8 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons chili powder



- · 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1 28 ounce can diced tomatoes
- 1 cup water
- 2 teaspoons lime juice or cider vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Cheddar cheese wedges and sliced green onions (optional)

Directions:

- 1. In a large skillet, cook chiles over medium heat for 3 to 4 minutes, turning occasionally, until lightly toasted. Cool at least 1 minute. Remove and discard stems and seeds. Transfer chiles to a large bowl; cover with boiling water. Let stand 20 minutes.
- **2.** Drain, reserving 1/3 cup of the soaking liquid. In a blender, puree chiles and reserved liquid; set aside.
- **3.** In a 5- to 6-quart Dutch oven, cook beef over medium-high heat about 8 minutes, until beginning to brown. Drain off fat. Transfer beef to a bowl.
- **4.** In the same pan cook bacon for 5 to 6 minutes, stirring occasionally, until browned.

- **5.** Stir in onions, green peppers, serrano peppers and garlic, cook for 7 minutes, stirring occasionally, until tender.
- **6.** Add pureed chiles; cook for 3 minutes, stirring often.
- 7. Add the chili powder and cumin; cook and stir for 1 minute.
- **8.** Add the reserved beef, diced tomatoes and water.
- **9.** Bring chili to boiling. Reduce heat to medium-low. Simmer, covered, about 30 minutes, until thickened
- **10.** Remove from heat; stir in vinegar and salt.

Top each serving with cheddar cheese and green onions.


