#### Bay Area Housing Crisis Hits the Woodlands...

Over the next several months, as the owner of the Citrus Circle office buildings proceed with the city permit process, re-development plans for the site will become clear. It is my understanding that the project planned is like other recent developments in our city; that is, high-density townhouses and multi-story condominiums.

Case in point is the Via Monte housing that's about to start construction behind the Orchards Safeway. This building is going to be a large multi-story condominium complex and bring much needed customers into the shopping center which still has many vacant storefronts. Combine this with the huge athletic center under construction at the former Contra Costa Times site, and the planned Extended Care Facility next door... can you picture it? The Shadelands, and our end of town, will become more urban as these developments are completed.



Yes, we need more housing, and developers will always push for the highest density possible because it's the most profitable. Our city leaders, based on recent downtown and Shadelands developments, will likely approve of this for Citrus Circle under the guise that it will be good for the community by helping with the housing shortage and giving more people the opportunity to buy into the neighborhood...is that the true reality?

We're at a critical juncture for our community; the Bay Area housing crisis has arrived with million-dollar 'starter' homes becoming the norm. It's time for residents of the Woodlands to become active in guiding what happens here next. Of course, we can't control area housing prices, or what our neighbors ask for when selling their homes, but we can have a say in the density of our neighborhood and how it's changing. Do you want this urbanization to continue; are you comfortable with the change, or are you worried that the character of the Woodlands will soon be a distant memory?

Whatever your opinion, I urge you to speak up and get involved. We have a great association with a newsletter that can be a vehicle to express your views...please keep the conversation going. Let's influence our city planners before this development gets away from us and we are forced to live with the consequences!

### **Keep Your Pets Cool During the Dog Days of Summer**

The "dog days of summer" is a phrase used to describe the hot and humid days of summer. It can be traced back thousands of years to the days of the Roman Empire. It refers to the dates from July 03 through August 11, which is 20 days prior and 20 days after the star Sirius rises and falls in conjunction with the sun. Sirius was known as the "Dog Star", because it is the brightest star in the constellation Canis Major (Large Dog).

The dangerous heat and humidity of these "dog days" can be harmful to not only humans, but human's best friend and other animals as well. Pets are considered family to many people, and in the event of an emergency, sometimes people will not evacuate if their pets have to be left behind. To gather information on how to protect your pets this summer, the National Weather Service reached out to Donnie Embrey, the Team Leader for Louisa Virginia Community Animal Response Team. Donnie and his team are part of a non-profit organization dedicated to emergency preparedness, response and management specifically focused on preparedness and response for pets and their owners. Here are a few things to keep in mind during the "dog days" this summer to help keep your pets safe."

Pets, just like humans, are susceptible to heat illness - make sure to keep your animals hydrated! For dogs, Donnie says "A good general guideline is that a healthy dog should drink between ½ and 1 ounce of water per pound of body weight each day under normal conditions. Of course, any pet will need more water on hot and humid days and your pet's age, hair type, level of activity, medical history and any prior history of a prior heat related illness may dictate that your pet needs more water than the average dog." When it comes to diet, Donnie says "reducing a pet's food intake on warmer days can help the pet cope with the heat, especially reducing the intake of grain-based foods that cause a metabolic spike in body temperature." A common misconception is that giving your pet a buzz cut in the summer is a good idea, but that may not be best for your pet. "A pet's coat acts as insulation, it keeps it warm in the winter and cool in the summer by blocking the heat of the sun from reaching the skin." For example, "the several layers of the dog's coat keep the heat out and air circulating. If you remove the natural cooling process the dog will have a harder time coping with the heat." Check with a veterinarian or professional groomer to find out what's best for your pet.



Hot asphalt or cement can easily burn an animal's paws, so try to minimize walking your pet during the hottest part of the day. Not sure how hot the asphalt is? Place the back of your hand on the asphalt - if it's too hot for you, it's too hot for them.

Also, as mentioned before, animals can suffer from heat illness. A few signs of heat illness in pets are rapid or irregular heart rate, excessive drooling, lethargy, refusal to eat, or excessive panting. "Panting is a normal cooling mechanism for a dog", says Donnie, "but a very bad sign for a cat. Be aware of excessive panting in dogs." If you notice any of these signs of heat illness "remove your pet from the heated environment and get it into a cooler environment. Apply cool towels to the pet, remove the towels, wring out the warm water, re-wet and reapply. Provide plenty of cool fresh water for the pet but be careful not to chill the pet."

Last but not least, NEVER leave a pet unattended inside a vehicle. The temperature inside a vehicle can rise very quickly and is just as dangerous for pets as it is for people. Rolling down the windows is not a safe alternative. Keep these things in mind and have a safe and fun-filled dog days of summer.

### Wildlife Watching in the Woodlands

Welcome to what I hope will be a semi-regular series of articles for The Woodlands newsletter! My family and I moved to the Woodlands in 2015 after spending 20 years in San Francisco. Since then, the neighborhood and the greater Walnut Creek area has seemed to reveal more and more about itself to us in measured increments. We fell in love with the neighborhood the first time we saw it—the big backyards, the friendly sidewalks with neighbors walking their dogs, the Cabana Club, the Canal Trail and Pine Creek. But that was just the tip of the iceberg! I hope to share some of my experiences as a Woodlands newcomer and capture some of the history and beauty of The Woodlands.




One of the first things I wondered about when we moved in was the wildlife we heard and saw. In our first year we spotted a North American Gray Fox twice in our backyard, which opens onto the Lime Ridge Open Space. Not only were we amazed to see these lovely, stealthy creatures in our yard, but fascinated to see that this member of the canine family can climb trees! We learned from a naturalist at Mt. Diablo State Park that the gray fox is one of only two animals in the canine family who can climb trees, the other being the East Asian Raccoon Dog. Once we adopted our first canine pet (a miniature poodle), the fox stopped dropping by. But there were plenty of other wildlife to marvel over!

We took up a keen interest in bird watching and were amazed by how many different birdsongs we could hear in our yard. We were accustomed to seeing and hearing Mourning Doves and Mocking Birds in the City (the Mocking Birds often imitated the call of car alarms just as well as they did other birds), but here in the Woodlands we became familiar with the sights and sounds of owls, hawks, kites, vultures, House Finches, Red-Winged Blackbirds, Robins, Scrub Jays, Canada Geese, California Towhees, woodpeckers, Western Bluebirds, and the enchanting ruffling sound of various species of hummingbirds' wings. Two Barn Swallow families crafted their mud nests near our front door and we watched several swallow couples become parents and teach their fledglings to fly. This Spring the house finches decided to make their nests inside the swallows' mud nests before they returned from their winter respite. Who knew finches would capitalize on another species' nests? We did not, and we tried to resist making jokes about the birds feeling the effects of the Bay Area housing shortage. More recently we have learned about guided bird and animal identification hikes offered by the Rangers of the Walnut Creek Open Space. They publish a brochure of events at the end of every June and December that describes the educational and environmental events they host over the upcoming six-month period. You can also find the events online at http://www.walnut-creek.org/departments/ open-space/open-space-activities. I hope to make it to one of the guided Lime Ridge hikes soon, and to one on Shell Ridge, and in the Acalanes Open Space ... perhaps we will cross paths there!
